




HS Graduation ≠ College-eligible

A one-semester class is worth 5 credits, so 10 credits equals one full school year. Note that dual or concurrent enrollment courses taken for college credit can earn 10 credits over a shorter period of time.

World Language requirement - PUSD requires only one year of a world language, but A-G requires 2 years, with 3 years recommended. Students entering high school with dual language or who are bilingual and can demonstrate proficiency can be placed in an appropriate language class, including classes for native speakers.

Grades matter! A student can "pass" a high school course and earn credit towards graduation requirements with a grade of D. But students need a grade of C or better in their A-G courses in order to be eligible for 4-year college admissions. Higher grades increase student's competitiveness for admissions and scholarships. (Free money!)



Zooming in: 8th Grade

Middle school is important because your child is laying the foundation in a lot of subjects and forming study habits. Developing certain skills now will make it easier for your child to adjust to the challenges of high school and college later — and will lead to more college options.

- Check out College Access Plan (CAP)!
- April high school counselors meet with 8th grade students to initiate a 4-year
 Academic Plan and schedule courses for 9th grade. This is a quick meeting, without
 a lot of time for getting questions answered. Parents may attend, but are not
 encouraged to ask a lot of questions. (District will send home registration packets
 ahead of time.)

Zooming in: 8th Grade

Pro-Tips:

- If your student is in a special program (IB, DLIP, Academy, Puente), be sure to let the counselor know. You may want to check with the program director about requirements (and options for fulfilling them) prior to your student meeting with the counselor.
- Keep in mind that changes can be made after this meeting, if necessary.
- Be sure your student's plan includes 4-year college as a goal!



Zooming in: 9th Grade

The beginning of high school is an exciting time. Your child may be adjusting to a new school, making new friends and becoming more independent. But many children struggle academically at the beginning of high school, so your child still needs your help and involvement.

- High Schools also offer "Wellness" services and mental health support. Check school website or ask!

PUSD Opportunities & Academic Support

- College Access Plan (CAP) CAP offers drop-in college counseling services after school twice-per-week at Blair, John Muir, Marshall Fundamental, and PHS. CAP also offers school-day programs at CIS and Rose City. Visit their High School Drop-In Program page for the current academic year schedule. Any student may take advantage of this program, whether to explore college options, discuss course (and other) requirements, learn about financial aid, work on a personal statement anything college-related!
- Upward Bound and the Early Academic Outreach Program (EAOP) are also available to PUSD students. These programs are both designed to expand postsecondary education opportunities for California's educationally disadvantaged students.
- Check your high school counseling office webpage for other school-specific academic support programs.
- High Schools also offer "Wellness" services and mental health support. Check school website or ask!

Zooming in: 9th Grade (continued)

Pro-tips:

- Many students struggle a bit academically when they start high school.
- Get in the habit of using <u>Aeries Parent Portal</u> to view your student's Academic Plan and make sure they are on track with course requirements as well as grades.
- A-G required courses must be passed with a C or higher to count towards college eligibility. Courses can be made up if necessary over summer or in twilight school.
- Check weekly e-bulletins sent out by the school for reminders of important dates or announcements of special programs or opportunities. (See also social media.)
- Use the summer between 9th & 10th to explore interests. Note that courses taken
 for high school credit during the summer before 10th grade count towards the
 student's high school GPA (grade point average) for college admissions purposes.

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

Zooming in: 10th Grade

Pro-Tips

- Beginning the summer before sophomore year (10th grade), GRADES MATTER!
 The UCs and CalStates no longer consider SAT scores, so a student's GPA (grade point average) and extracurricular activities matter even more.
- Take AP and Honors courses in areas where student is interested and has potential to do well. Colleges want to see that students are challenging themselves, but it's better to do so in areas of interest/strength than to try to take on more than student can manage successfully.
- Encourage student to explore interests clubs, sports, volunteer opportunities, summer
 programs it's great to explore possible interests in 9th and 10th grade, but students
 who can tell a compelling story about who they are and how they are pursuing the
 things that interest them will be more attractive college candidates than those who are
 just randomly doing a lot of different kinds of activities.
- Use your summers well!

Exploring college options



There are a LOT of options, so do not limit your thinking to a handful of colleges or universities. In addition to over 100 community colleges that grant 2-year Associate's degrees (as well as opportunities to transfer to a 4-year college), there are:

23 Cal State University campuses	Min. GPA 2.0; deadline 11/30 Short answers, letters of rec.
9 University of California campuses	Min. GPA 3.0; deadline 11/30 4 essays, worksheets, letters of recommendation
100s of private colleges and universities in and out of state.	Min GPA varies, may req. SAT; Common Ap + some additional essays, letters of rec.

Zooming in: 11th Grade

Junior year marks a turning point, when academics and college planning activities kick into high gear.

11th Grade: Counselor-initiated activities

- PUSD students create CCGI account (if they have not already) & complete resource interest inventories; parents can also create an account to track/monitor college planning progress
- College list matched to careers
- PSAT/NMSQT (Fall) In addition to predicting success on the SAT, the PSAT taken junior year qualifies students to be eligible for possible National Merit Scholarships
- SAT/ACT (Spring)
- "Brag Sheet" students compile list of achievements and activities for teachers and counselors who will be writing letters of recommendation for them
- Social Emotional Learning dealing with anxiety



Pro-tips for Junior Year

- Have your child make a College Board account using non-PUSD email, save the information, and share with you. (You should also be able to create a parent account to see your student's CCGI account activity.)
- It's not so much about doing ALL THE THINGS as it is about a student discovering her or his passions, strengths, and interests. Get involved with just a couple of clubs or activities and grow involvement and leadership in those areas rather than joining half a dozen clubs.
- Similarly do not try to take ALL the AP classes! Match your child's interests, strengths, and possible major.
- Summer programs if there is a program of interest that requires an application to participate, that will look better than a program anyone can participate in by just paying a fee. Students in PUSD's College & Career Academies can get a leg up on internship opportunities the summer after junior year.
- Internships, jobs, or volunteer positions where a 3rd party can attest to the hours your student put in carries more weight than a family-based activity.

Zooming in: 11th grade, continued

Pro-tips for Junior Year

Don't forget to looks for College Access Plan (CAP)-sponsored workshops for students and info sessions for parents. For example, CAP currently runs a 6-week (March-April) after-school program for juniors: Enrolled students will get a head start on their college list, college resume, and the college and financial aid application process in a fun, low-key workshop series open to all PUSD juniors.

Dual & Concurrent Enrollment

You may have heard that PUSD students have the opportunity to earn college credit while still in high school. Research shows that students earning college credits while in high school not only graduate high school, but are much more likely to complete a college degree. Pasadena Unified School District partners with Pasadena City College to give students this opportunity, but the options vary by school, and students need to check in with their counselor to discuss what courses are available, what kind of credit they can earn, and how this will work with their schedule and academic goals.



Dual & Concurrent Enrollment

Concurrent Enrollment - Students can enroll in Pasadena City College courses offered after school hours (or during the summer) to receive transferable college credits while still in high school. These courses do *not* count toward the 220-credit requirement for PUSD graduation, but may be used to fulfill specific high school course requirements.

Dual Enrollment allows eligible students to enroll in college courses that earn them credit *both* toward their high school diploma *and* transferable college credit. Courses are offered on the high school campus and are considered part of the student's instructional day.

Zooming in: 12th Grade

12th Grade - Counselor-initiated activities

- College Applications (Fall Oct. 1-Nov. 30)
 - O Ask for letters of recommendation early!
 - "PIQ"s Personal Insight Questions students choose 3 of 5 topics to respond to in preparation for writing college essays
- Financial Aid & Financial Literacy lessons (Oct 1- Mar 2) go over difference between public & private colleges, loans vs. scholarships or grants, etc.



Zooming in: 12th Grade


- 4-Year Plan individual counseling (graduation requirement checks & A-G checks)
- Next Steps (Spring Semester)
 - Meeting deadlines
 - Checking college portals
 - o "Commit Day" is May 1

PUSD Opportunities & Pro-tips

- College Access Plan can help students research scholarships and grants, as well as complete financial aid forms and understand loan options. CAP also helps families evaluate financial aid offers once college acceptances arrive.
- There is a lot going on Senior year, and for many students this is a time to enjoy the present rather than worry about the future. Having things organized so you can help your student keep track of what needs doing (and when) can help everyone have a better senior year!
